JCS's 2023 journey and beyond

We pride ourselves on creating a unique blend of support-based, fun, and informative events to nurture peoples' wellbeing and create structure.

In October JCS celebrated their 165th birthday, marking 165 years that the organisation has been delivering services and positively impacting the local Jewish community. The organisation started in 1858, as the Glasgow Hebrew Philanthropic Society, with a group of volunteers eager to help wherever they could and has grown into a professional charity that provides innovative, individual care. Throughout the years, the charity evolved, shifting with the ever-changing needs of the community. In 1996 The Glasgow Jewish Welfare Board engaged in radical change, renaming themselves Jewish Care Scotland before permanently moving their headquarters from Coplaw street in Govanhill to The Walton Community Care Centre in Giffnock. A lot has changed between the initial establishment of the Glasgow Hebrew Philanthropic Society and the Jewish Care Scotland that we know and celebrate today.

Our Rosh Hashana annual appeal continues to be our biggest fundraiser of the year and is crucial to the continuation of our ongoing services. With hundreds of individuals and families receiving support from the charity each year, the annual appeal is essential for us to maintain our vital services. This year we reached out to almost 1,000 supporters who generously raised a combined total of £41,000 towards the lifeline services delivered by Jewish Care Scotland.

Today, in early March 2024 it seems like Spring is very much just around the corner, and JCS intend on working to ensure the services offered are the best possible fit for the local community! 2023 was one packed year, representative of the care that has been provided to the community over the past century and more. We pride ourselves on creating a unique blend of supportbased, fun, and informative events to nurture peoples' wellbeing and create structure. This year we've made it our mission to continuously speak to people in the community, establishing others' views on ICS's current offerings and aligning our services more closely to peoples' wants and needs. 

Glasgow's beloved Henry Wuga dies age 100

The Holocaust Memorial Day Trust sadly announced that Henry Wuga had died, just a month after celebrating his 100th birthday.

Henry Wuga lived an extraordinary life. At just 15 years old Mr. Henry Wuga was evacuated from Nazi Germany, escaping to Glasgow where he became instrumental in educating people about the horrors of the Holocaust. He spent the majority of his life working to preserve records of the Holocaust; enabling people to learn about his remarkable life while guiding the community that had taken him in as a child refugee.

He later married and raised a family with Ingrid Wolffe, a fellow German-Jewish refugee. The couple continued to play an active role in engaging with schools, delivering speeches and classes on the Holocaust.

At one point, Wuga worked as a ski instructor for the British Limbless Ex-Servicemen's Association where he taught veterans who had lost limbs to ski, for which he was named a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (MBE) in 1999.

JCS's Head of Community and Wellbeing,
Lynsey Allan recalls: "In later years Henry
supported his wife, Ingrid. Ingrid was a
great character at the club and I remember
she particularly enjoyed sitting in the
sunshine, as well as an occasional afternoon
snooze! I was always touched by the sight
of Henry waiting to collect her from the bus
at the end of the day. They were clearly a
great partnership and a loving couple."
As renowned figure in the Glasgow-Jewish
community Henry was a dedicated
Holocaust educator whose light shined on
many. His story lives on in everyone who
was lucky enough to hear it.

"When Henry and his wife attended Jewish Care Scotland clubs from time to time it was a great privilege to have them here."
